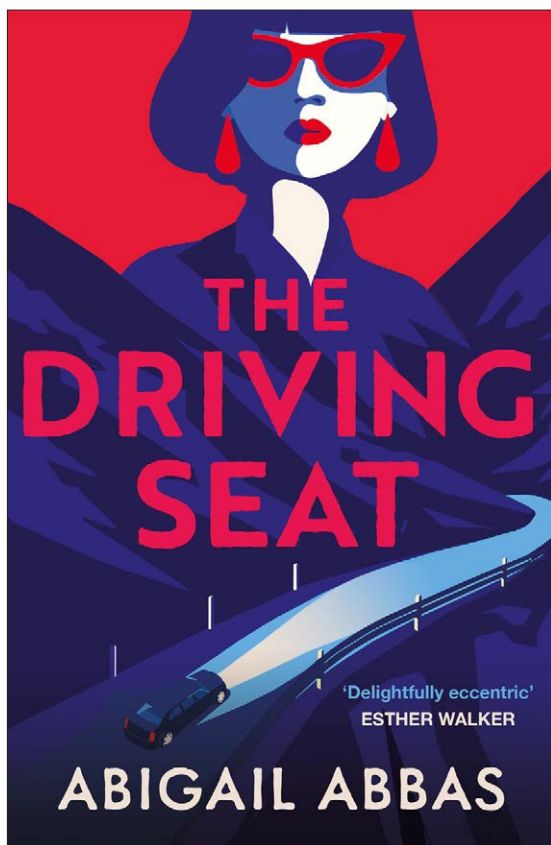

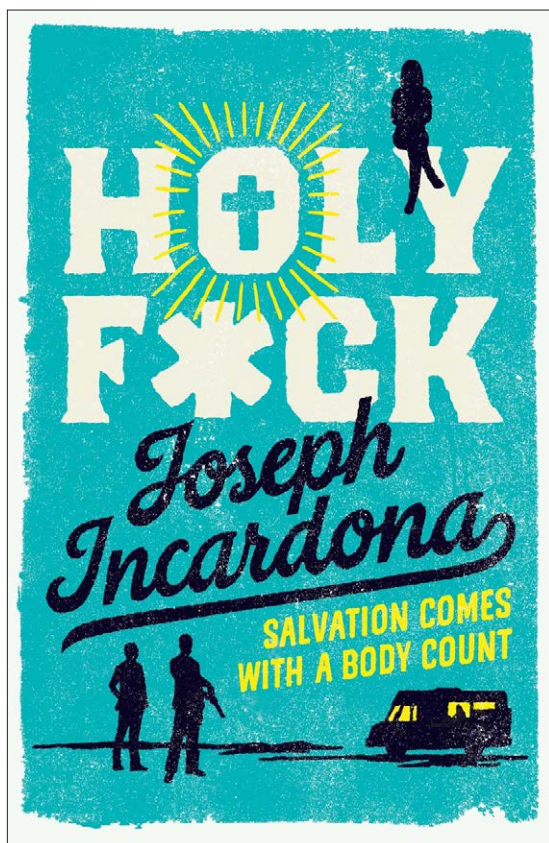

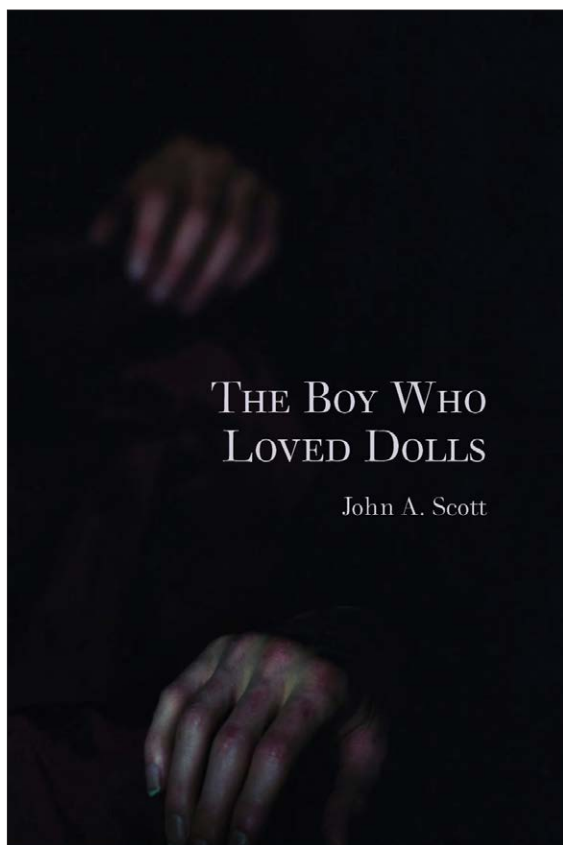

The only hitch? Her method: she heals the people she sleeps with in her motorhome. And she sleeps with a lot of people, it's what she does for a living. And that's precisely what's bothering the Vatican. For Luis Molina of the Savannah News, this story smells like a Pulitzer for sure. For the Vatican, it smells more like trouble. A saintly hooker isn't exactly presentable. A martyred saint, on the other hand, has a conveniently rewritten past. That's a job tailor-made for the Bronski twins – the best contract killers in the business.

Provided, of course, they manage to get their hands on innocent little Stella. America is a big place. Joseph Incardona sets his new story in a dusty, wacky United States. He excels in its film noir atmosphere: travelling funfairs on the outskirts of small towns forgotten by everyone, lost motels, freaks and the disenfranchised. It's reminiscent of the Coen brothers, Tarantino and del Toro, but also a homage to the novels of Harry Crews.

The Boy Who Loved Dolls is set in 1987 Australia, mainly at the renowned (and reclusive) French film director, Jean-Jacques Baille's secluded country residence. Susan Vaughan, an eccentric young film critic and independent documentary-maker, is granted a once-in-a-lifetime chance to conduct a series of video-taped interviews staying with her long-term 'cultural icon'. Unknown to her she learns that he is also an obsessive collector and restorer of rare and, at times, unnerving dolls.

What starts out as an in-depth investigation into the themes, techniques and patterns within his groundbreaking work – many featuring his Australian-born wife Anna – and a probing dissection of his most recent semi-biographical film – slowly turns into a cat-and-mouse game in which we find Baille is leading Susan towards his hidden past and the truth behind his wife's disappearance.

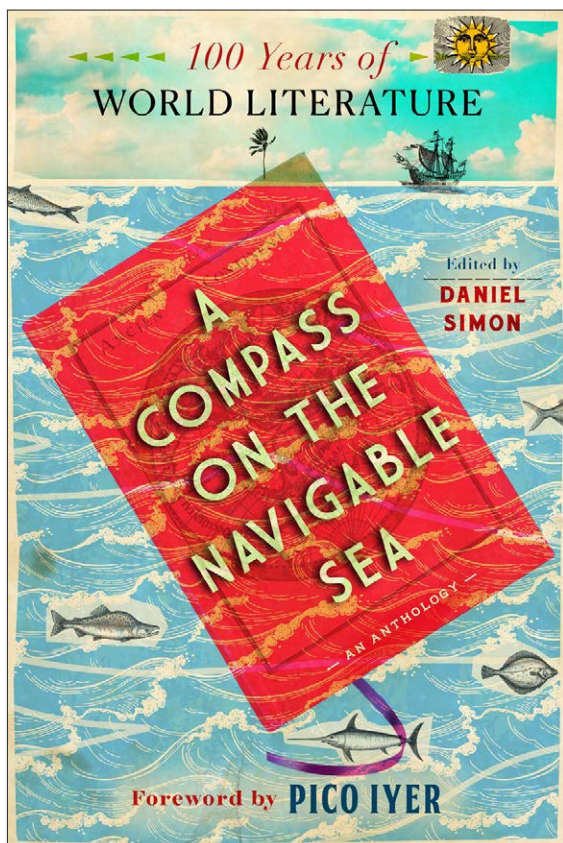

About the author:

John A. Scott is the author of eighteen books, several of which have been translated and published internationally. In Australia, they have received numerous shortlistings (twice for the Miles Franklin), and received Victorian Premier's Prizes for both poetry and fiction. The film version of his novel *What I Have Written* – directed by John Hughes, from the AWGIE-winning screenplay by Scott – was selected for Competition at Berlin and Stockholm Film Festivals and won the International Mystery Film Festival, Bologna. His major experimental novel, *N*, was shortlisted for the Victorian Premier's Prize and was one of the *Guardian's* Books of the Year. His most recent work, *Shorter Lives* (Puncher & Wattmann, 2020), is a collection of non-fiction sonnets and prose poems resurrecting a project abandoned in 1967. Shortlisted for the 2021 Prime Minister's Award for Poetry. A 240 page study of his work by Peter D. Mathews – *From Poet to Novelist: The Orphic Journey Of John A. Scott* – was released last year from Cambria Press, New York.

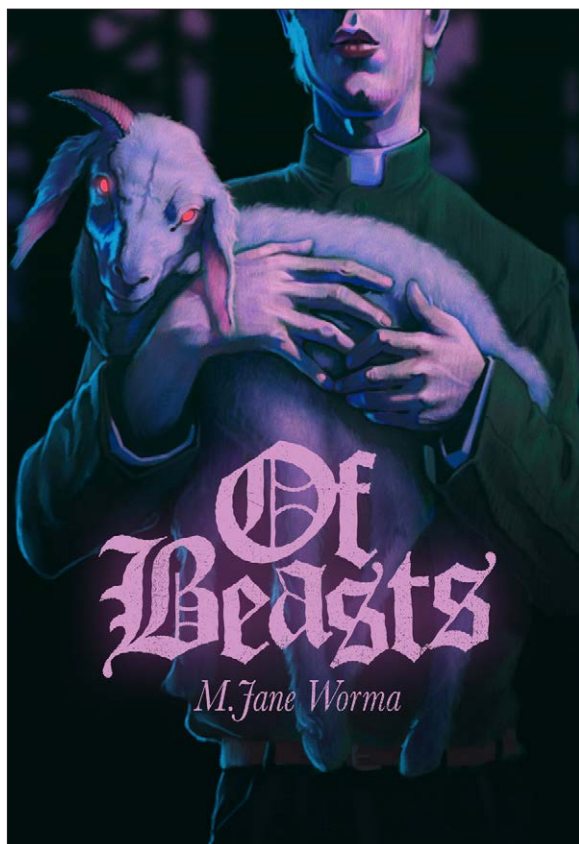

The author of three books of poems, **Daniel Simon** is a poet, essayist, translator, and *World Literature Today's* assistant director and editor in chief. His 2017 edited volume, *Nebraska Poetry: A Sesquicentennial Anthology*, won a 2018 Nebraska Book Award. His most recent edited collection, *Dispatches from the Republic of Letters: 50 Years of the Neustadt International Prize for Literature* (2020), was a *Publishers Weekly* starred pick.

Pico Iyer was born in Oxford, England in 1957. He won a King's Scholarship to Eton and then a Demyship to Magdalen College, Oxford, where he was awarded a Congratulatory Double First with the highest marks of any English Literature student in the university. In 1980 he became a Teaching Fellow at Harvard, where he received a second Master's degree, and in subsequent years he has received an honorary doctorate in Humane Letters. Since 1982 he has been a full-time writer, publishing 15 books, translated into 23 languages, on subjects ranging from the Dalai Lama to globalism, from the Cuban Revolution to Islamic mysticism. They include such long-running sellers as *Video Night in Kathmandu*, *The Lady and the Monk*, *The Global Soul*, *The Open Road* and *The Art of Stillness*. He has also written the introductions to more than 70 other books, as well as liner and program notes, a screenplay for Miramax and a libretto.

In this queer horror novel debut, a priest falls in love with the antichrist and even God can’t stop the horror it will bring.

Dante, a protestant young man, and Jude, a sadistic pastor of a small Texas church, harbor a terrible secret from the world; they’re together. The two share a taboo and passionate relationship in hidden peace, until the dreams start.

God speaks to them in visions of smoke and fire, night after night, until the two of them come to a truth they cannot ignore; Dante is the Antichrist, sent by God and urged to start off the apocalypse.

Dante refuses to participate in the end of the world and the damnation of souls. But Jude is a loyal pastor, indifferent to the suffering of others, and is compelled to do what God tells him; even if it means killing the love of his life.

This queer horror love story hones in on the humanity of the Antichrist, a half-human entity as flawed, complex, and doomed as any other soul. With lyrical prose reminiscent of Clive Barker, blasphemy is redefined and love is tested. In *Of Beasts*, Worma explores if love is enough for someone born to be evil.
